Hope Is a Thing with Ears

Eighty years ago, the long global nightmare of WWII was nearly at an end when a tall, invisible rabbit first stepped onto the stage, blinking in the glare of the spotlight.

Harvey sprang from the imagination of Mary Coyle Chase, a woman who grew up in a working-class Irish-American household in

Denver, where she heard magical tales of fairy folk, banshees and pookas. As an adult, she turned to writing her own stories, at first in the rough and tumble field of journalism where women were rare. In spite of her talent and hard work, she was soon relegated to the society pages.

Turning to other writing pursuits, Mary decided to try her hand at creative writing. She was living happily with her husband and children, but she often saw her neighbor, a widow woman who would leave her apartment to ride the bus to work every day. Until one day, she wasn't there. Mary learned the woman had just lost her son, a bombardier, over the Pacific. A week later, Mary saw the woman again, leaving her apartment and making her way, much slower now, to the bus. Mary thought, could I ever write something that would give her a reason to laugh again? And Harvey was born.

With 1,775 performances, Harvey was one of the longest running dramas on Broadway and is still one of the most-often produced plays in communities across the country. It won the Pulitzer Prize for drama in 1945. It has been translated into almost every

language and performed in nearly every country around the world.

One could see Harvey's success as the result of a welcome escape from the trauma of WWII, and today, from the strife we constantly see all around us. But on a deeper level, Harvey asks us to look at our attitudes about difference and how threatened society can feel when someone fails to conform to expectations. Elwood's friends – especially Harvey – are seen as completely inappropriate and profoundly embarrassing, to the point where his family thinks that Elwood shows signs of insanity.

Elwood does see the invisible – people's quirks and foibles, their uniqueness and – in spite of all evidence to the contrary – their fundamental goodness. And he somehow makes the invisible real.

The tale about a tall invisible rabbit and the man who befriends him resonates as strongly today as it did 80 years ago, as society is yet again struggling with persecution of difference and how we should deal with those who are different from the "norm," whether that difference is who we love, what we believe or who we are.




